

Week One: July 10th to July 14th

Teaching Grade 1 - The Magic of First Grade

We will begin by looking at child development and the image and needs of the grade one child. The morning will be dedicated to bringing the curriculum in a living and appropriate way: introducing the letters out of pictures, reading what the children have written, connecting the child with the world of numbers, storytelling and more. Participants will create their own main lesson books, being guided in the use of block and stick crayons, just as the children are taught. Every morning we will practise elements of the daily "circle", including developmental exercises, poetry, songs, rhythms and body arithmetic. In the afternoon, we will practise the artistic activities that are essential to child development: beeswax modeling, painting, music, form drawing, drama, nature studies. We will look at working with the temperaments, holding parent evenings, and guiding nature walks.



MICHELLE FRANK, TORONTO WALDORF SCHOOL

Michelle has worked full-time at the Toronto Waldorf School since 2000. She has been a member of the Therapeutic Circle since 1998 and pioneered counselling work in Waldorf schools. She has a B.A. from Brock University and a Theraplay Therapist Certification from the Theraplay Institute in Chicago. Her son

currently attends TWS; her daughters have both graduated from the school.

Teaching Grade 2 - Searching for the Sword of Light

Drawing from the rich literature of this grade, we will enhance the study of teaching the children to write with pencils focusing on correct pencil grip and drawing using block and stick crayons (painting drawing).

Themes will include the fables wherein the children can recognize their own and others' human characteristics in one-sided animals, and also heroes or saints, the lives of those who heard their inner voice and brought light down onto the earth.

Balancing the duality children experience as the nine year change in consciousness approaches is the goal! Building confidence in learning and enthusiasm for new things helps develop this balance.

Artistic skills to be practised include modeling with clay and beeswax, using moving pictures, and singing and playing pentatonic recorder (bring your own), mathematics through movement, form drawing as well as chalkboard drawing of images appropriate for the grade.

Teaching Grade 3 - Making a Home on Earth

Children want to be seen, to be safe, cared for and offered challenges that help them take their next steps in making a home on earth. Our challenge as teachers is to recognize where they are currently growing and to meet them there. In this task the Waldorf curriculum is a brilliant guide, but it too requires our understanding and innovation to meet these unique times. We will dive into grade 3 curriculum, how and why it is so effective, and point towards possible innovations.

We will explore ways to strengthen academic, social and physical skills through daily work and practice. We will look at the practical and preparatory work for third grade teachers including block rotations, effective classroom rhythms, the dance of inspiration and discipline, as well as strengthening parent and collegial relationships. We will work extensively through doing, through the arts and through conversation. Lessons will include singing and moving, clay modeling, form drawing, and painting to give you inspiration and resources for the coming year.



WARREN COHEN, TORONTO WALDORF SCHOOL

Warrren holds a B.A. from Northwestern University in Chicago and an M.Ed. from the Open University in the U.K. He has served Waldorf education in a variety of roles: as a class teacher in the US, as an adult educator in the U.K. and in Canada as director of Waldorf Teacher Education at RSCT where he also founded the Summer

Festival of Arts and Education. Currently he is the fourth grade teacher at TWS. His publications include: "Raising the Soul: Practical Exercises for Personal Development", "Baking Bread with Children", and in 2022 "The Waldorf Book of Blessings".



Teaching Grade 4 - Entering the Heart of Childhood

Poised between childhood and adolescence, the ten-year-old child begins to ask the question: Who am I? In their quest for differentiation, they enthusiastically take up challenges with powerful new abilities and a strong feeling life. As they come to meet the world they want to know it intellectually.

Looking through this developmental lens, we will explore the emerging academics of the fourth grade curriculum. They include fractions where the theme of separateness is further reflected, language arts with a focus on descriptive writing, scenes from ancient history (not just the Norse myths), finding a sense of place through the study of geography, and exploring the human being's relationship to the animal world.

Woven throughout will be artistic experiences, movement, form drawing and much more. Practical aspects of block rotations, lesson plans, student skill levels, parent work and assessment will also be discussed.



REKA BORBELY, LONDON WALDORF SCHOOL

Reka completed her M. Ed. at Western University. Prior to this she earned a B.Ed., and a Catholic Teacher Training at Esztergom, Hungary, and the University of Glasgow, Scotland.

She also has her Hungarian Primary Teaching Certificate, Ontario Teaching Certificate, and Foundation Studies in Anthroposophy.

She has taken two classes from grades 1 through 8 at the London Waldorf School where she has taught since 2001.

Teaching Grade 5 - From Heaven to Earth in the Golden Year

Between childhood and adolescence stands this golden year of fifth grade. The children are becoming more balanced in proportions and abilities. The grade 5 teacher is called upon to guide them through a content-packed, exciting, and pivotal year. The curriculum spans a vast period of ancient history, from India through Persia, Mesopotamia, Egypt, culminating with the mythologies and history of ancient Greece. These blocks lend a perfect opportunity to expand their writing skills and continue their work on grammar.

In mathematics the children strengthen their knowledge of fractions, are introduced to decimals, and practise freehand geometry. Botany hones their observational skills through art and descriptive writing in preparation for the middle school sciences. The study of the geography of Canada builds an understanding of the foundation of our land by creating a deeper sense of respect and understanding for the first peoples. Daily physical movement builds enthusiasm for the eagerly anticipated Olympiad. This week's activities will include curriculum overview, resource sharing, anthroposophical insight, artistic endeavours, singing and recorder, games, and a taste of Olympiad skills. Come prepared to move!



Mary-lu Spinney, Toronto Waldorf School

After studying biology at the University of Western Ontario, Mary-lu moved to Toronto to complete a three-year intensive training program in contemporary dance at the School of Toronto Dance Theatre. She worked as a choreographer, director and performer for over ten years. In 2002 she completed her yoga

teaching certification in Ashtanga yoga. In 2010 she completed Foundation Studies and in 2011 her Waldorf Teacher Education at Rudolf Steiner Centre Toronto. Mary-lu graduated her grade 8 class in 2021 and is currently teaching gardening at TWS.



Teaching Grade 6 – Facing Twelve Year Olds with Courage, Compassion and Rigour

The grade 5 year is spent in the company of living, growing plants and the world of grand mythology. In 6th grade mythology gives way to history. Botany takes a back seat to the inorganic world of stars and stones, light and sound. It's a profound shift for almost every class teacher. Our students are challenged by long limbs, big feet, vibrant emotions, and insecurity. Steiner helps us understand the physical, soul and spiritual changes they are undergoing and offers a brilliant curriculum to meet these young adolescents.

At every turn there is the chance for a metamorphosis: in ways of teaching, in relationships, within the very core of our being as teachers. What a magnificent year! We will survey the major blocks in the 6th grade and how each meets the students' need to know, to understand, and to think. In the humanities, we will explore Roman history, the medieval world (Europe, Asia, Africa, the Americas), and strategize about writing skills. In the sciences, we will begin with geometry, study caves and volcanoes, experiment with light and sound. Golden threads of singing, poetry, and drama will weave it all together.



JESSICA GLADIO, TRILLIUM WALDORF SCHOOL

Jessica Gladio has been a class teacher at the Trillium Waldorf School in Guelph, Ontario for the past 12 years where she is currently in her second cycle of teaching through the grades. She is the current faculty chair. She received her Waldorf teaching certificate from RSCT in 2009, holds a B.A. in communication

studies and fine arts from Concordia University in Montreal. She has been a lifelong learner, attending every possible conference, course and seminar she can. Jessica's passion for Waldorf education has recently been fuelled by conversations about responsible innovations and the movement's commitment to DEI.



Week One: July 10th to July 14th

Teaching Grade 7 - Out Into the World

During this week we will explore the developmental stage of 12 and 13-year-olds, particularly in light of present day culture. Participants will receive a detailed description of each block in order to individualize those blocks for their students. Planning and choosing resources, along with designing a healthy rhythm for the day, week, month and year will be covered.

Other topics include balance in your teaching year and parent education and communication. This course will include presentation of topics each day. However, dialogue arising from questions and experiences are heartily encouraged. Afternoons together will consist of artistic activities: painting, perspective drawing, and creative writing. Bring a song or game to share if you feel inspired.



HENRY MUTH, TRILLIUM WALDORF SCHOOL

Henry Muth has been a class teacher at Trillium Waldorf School for 13 years. He studied at Rudolf Steiner Centre Toronto and earlier at the Ontario College of Art and Design. As well as an educator, Henry is a woodworker, visual artist, and musician. He lives with his wife and three boys in Guelph, Ontario.

Teaching Grade 8 - Completing the Octave

Grade 8 represents the octave of an eight-year cycle, building on everything that has come before and anticipating the students' next educational journey into high school and beyond.

Working out of the students' developmental stage, we will see how the curriculum supports their thinking, strengthens their confidence, and informs their attitudes concerning social issues.

In history, the age of revolutions and the study of different industrial revolutions provide a compelling leitmotif for the year. In the sciences, anatomy, organic chemistry and physics, and meteorology continue to hone the students' observational skills as a foundation for flexible thinking.

In geography, themes of social justice and economic responsibility are explored on a worldwide scale. In math Platonic solids challenge their conceptual thinking in a multi-disciplinary and unexpected way.

We will go over proposed outlines for the various blocks, look at project and novel study possibilities, and—for chemistry and physics—demonstrate a few representative experiments that will provide a clear path forward.

The week will include a practical, hands-on approach to the curriculum with clay modeling, geometric constructions and charcoal drawing.

Carlina has a B.Sc (Mechanical Engineering) from Queen's University. The Group of Seven and the Spiritual in Art - Mornings


In search of a Canadian identity in art and driven by a common spiritual yearning, several painters came together in 1920 as The Group of Seven. No discussion of these wonderful artists would be complete without an investigation of Theosophy, the mystical painters of Scandinavia and Russia, Wassily Kandinsky's *Concerning the Spiritual in Art*, and the Group's great Canadian contemporaries Emily Carr and Tom Thomson. Sacred geometry will be included as an artistic activity



JULIAN MULOCK, ARTIST

Born in England of Canadian parents, Julian spent his formative years in Waldorf schools in England before moving to Canada. He graduated with honours from the three-year Special Art Course at Central Technical School, Toronto and in 1972 joined the staff of the Royal Ontario Museum as a scientific illustrator

before embarking on an independent career as a freelance illustrator, muralist and painter.



Differentiation and Individualization in Teaching - Mornings

Nettie Fabrie and Wim Gottenbos are co-authors of Making Math Meaning-fulTM: A Source Book for Teaching Math in Grades One to Five.

This new course provides an opportunity for teachers to explore deeper aspects of the Waldorf curriculum and teaching and bring what they learn into practice with colleagues at their schools. The course will explore how to:

- Deepen our capacity for child observation and understanding child development
- Further an understanding and practical application of individualization and differentiation (polarities, temperaments, learning styles)
- Better connect our teaching to the impulse of anthroposophy
- Develop new impulses in our teaching through collegial collaboration
- Share wisdom and wealth from our experience
- Re-enliven the genius of individual subjects
- Re-enliven the rhythm of the week
- Find inspiration and renewal as experienced teachers



NETTIE FABRIE began her 40-year teaching career in the Netherlands, first in the public schools and then as a Waldorf class teacher, taking two classes from first through eighth grade. From 2001-2018 Nettie served as a teacher and then pedagogical director at the Seattle Waldorf School. She founded a Waldorf teacher training program in the Czech Republic and directed the

Grade School Teacher Training at Sound Circle Center in Seattle.



WIM GOTTENBOS taught in Dutch public schools for 12 years before training and becoming a Waldorf teacher. He then carried three classes at the Seattle Waldorf school. In 2017 he retired from class teaching to work as a mentor and evaluator in the Pacific Northwest. He is also part of the Mentorship Seminar and teacher training program at Sound Circle Center.



Week Two: July 17th to July 21st

Form Drawing for Grades 1-3, Afternoons I

Beginning with the straight line and the curve, this course will show you how to introduce the "right" form to grade 1 students and then continue with vertical mirror forms for Grade 1 horizontal mirror forms for grade 2.

The grade 3 form drawing curriculum and demonstration will include mirror forms in quadrants and running forms as an introduction to cursive writing.

Form Drawing for Grades 4-8, Afternoons II

The children in grade 4 delight in the challenges of Celtic forms, the crossing and weaving up forms. Based on the foundational learning in grades 1-4, the students begin to create free forms. grade 5 and up will be dedicated to free-hand drawing and perspective drawing.

Eurythmy for Grades 4-8, Afternoons I

In grades 4 to 8, pedagogical eurythmy is used to strengthen the incarnated individuality, harmonize oneself with the group and eventually develop an expressive vocabulary in time for the onset of puberty. This is a journey from lightness to heaviness and the goal is to lay the right foundations of movement habits and capacity to find equilibrium between lethargy and hyperactivity. We will do exercises that are typical for these grades. Please bring comfortable clothes to move in and eurythmy slippers.

Eurythmy for Grades 1-3, Afternoons II

In grades 1 to 3, pedagogical eurythmy invites the child into their body in a healthy way. Clothed in games, stories and dances, eurythmy exercises utilise rhythms and movement to weave the individuality, the life forces and the physical body into a whole. We will experience doing exercises that are typical for these grades. Please bring comfortable clothes to move in and eurythmy slippers.



JONATHAN SNOW, TORONTO WALDORF SCHOOL

Jonathan is an alumnus of Toronto Waldorf School. He pursued eurythmy internationally, completing both artistic and pedagogical training in Stuttgart, Germany, obtaining the eurythmy teacher Bachelor of Arts in The Hague, Netherlands and participating in workshops in the USA. He is a certified Bothmer® gymnast,



Art for Humanity's Sake - Afternoons


There are many ways to look at art today in order to re-discover its purpose. In this workshop I'd like to focus on what I call the "New Basics." When we look out at the natural world, we sense "hidden laws" in countless sensory impressions. Artists have worked with these "hidden laws" for thousands of years in order to create the great works of art that we find in museums today. It is no longer appropriate to say, "I don't know anything about art, but I know what I like." We now have to define what is beautiful, especially in a contemporary world that places ugliness on a pedestal. And what are these "hidden laws? In a combination of presentations, slides and art exercises – watercolour painting, charcoal drawing – we will reveal these hidden laws and explore how they come to expression both in nature and in great works of art.



LARRY YOUNG, ARTIST

Larry Young is a graphic designer, educator, painter, sculptor, photographer and filmmaker. As a teacher at the Green Meadow Waldorf School in Spring Valley, he created a high-school art curriculum based on Rudolf Steiner's perception of the changing adolescent. In 1994, he designed and installed the Truth and

Beauty - the Role of the Arts in Waldorf Education exhibit at Saint-John the Divine Cathedral in NYC that was viewed by an estimated 200,000 people.

Waldorf Essentials - Mornings

In this course, Merwin will speak out of his extensive experience to give the essentials of Waldorf education, including the stages of child development, curriculum and methodology, and the role of parents in the school. Here all your questions from "What is a Waldorf teacher?" to the role of technology in a Waldorf school will be answered.



MERWIN LEWIS, LONDON WALDORF SCHOOL



With these you can create many magical puppet shows on your lap or table top, in a living room, in a garden or on a forest walk for your children, grandchildren or class. Celebrate birthdays, seasonal festivals, or just have fun. As we work we will explore ideas for staging, stories, movement and gesture.

Geography and Maps - Mornings


This week we will be exploring geography and how it is taught in Waldorf schools. We will review Steiner's indications for the teaching of geography and see how they can be applied in a practical way.

We will practise our artistic skills as they relate to geography, including chalk-board drawing, coloured pencils, singing and movement. The geography curriculum of the grades will be thoroughly reviewed, and we will work together to find innovations that could help the contemporary student "look into the world".

Week Three: July 24th to July 28th

Veil Painting - Afternoons

Veil painting is a water colour technique using almost transparent colours. It begins with no plan or distinct form in mind but rather a flowing journey into the life of the colour. The colours are never mixed on a palette but only one wash at a time over white paper, a previous wash, or a veil that has dried. Slowly the thin almost translucent overlapping layers of pigment begin to mysteriously birth multiple tones and shades of colour. These eventually begin to coalesce into a subtle form that can be either abstract or form a distinct motif which can then be enhanced. This is truly painting out of the colour. Each veil of colour requires flexibility from the artist as the effect changes with every successive wash and the unknown slowly reveals itself – a meditative process that both challenges and refreshes the soul.



JEF SAUNDERS

Jef Saunders is co-founder of Arscura School for Living Art. For the last 22 years he has taught biography, art and core studies at Arscura. Previously he was a therapeutic artist and biography worker at an anthroposophical medical practice. He particularly likes to teach veil painting as an antidote to the intensive,

unrelenting stress of modern life.



Painting in Grades 4-8 - Afternoons

This course is designed to give a comprehensive overview of the Waldorf art curriculum from grades 4 to 8. Anna's extensive research on the esoteric meaning of colour, combined with her experience in the classroom will help you become an artist in unfolding the curriculum across the grades. Learn how watercolour painting works upon etheric and soul qualities reaching beyond the world of thought and words.

Questions of suitable colour arrangement, the introduction of form, when to include drawing as an art practice, and when to introduce thinking to the creative process will be addressed.



Anna Gruda, Artist

Anna Gruda has been a class teacher and art specialist at Edgehill School, Toronto Waldorf School and Waldorf Academy. She has also been on the faculty of RSCC for 15 years, involved with teacher education and Foundation Studies. She is a practising artist and has held workshops for adults and children at the

Durham Art Gallery and at Hesperus. Currently she is serving as a mentor and giving lessons in her garden.

Biography: The Art of Life - Afternoons

Having a grasp of the first 21 years of one's own biography is really a prerequisite for teaching. It builds a foundation for working with children in the classroom and makes us happier and healthier human beings. Rudolf Steiner's fascinating way of looking at life and life cycles gives us a new and deeper appreciation of who we are and how we are unique inidviduals. Yet we have so much in common, struggling with the same basic issues: Who am I? Why am I here? How do I relate to others?

The first 21 years will be our beginning but then as adults, life goes on and the fun really starts as we continue to build on the biggest work of art, the unfolding of our adult life through midlife and into older age. Biography work is a good process to explore, even if we have not yet reached those years. In fact it is essential to look into the distant future before it arrives! Vision and intention for our life help us to engage with challenges. It is equally important to look into the future as it is to look into the past because a whole new dimension to life may be revealed. Join us in remembering, sensing and envisioning YOUR life!

Foundation Studies in Anthroposophy

Full-Time Waldorf Teacher Education, Grades & EC

Ever since our founding in 1984, we have offered a full-time one-year Waldorf teacher education program.
